



St Mary's Church letter - The Art of Precious Scars

Dear Friends,

In 2006 three vases of the Qing dynasty were knocked over by a man who tripped, in a Norman Wisdom moment, at a museum in Cambridge. The vases, worth around £300,000, broke into hundreds of pieces causing consternation all around. Amazingly after months of painstaking work they were put back together by experts in a seamless restoration.

It reminded me of the distinctly different Japanese art of mending broken ceramics. By repairing broken ceramics it's possible to give a new lease of life to pottery so that it becomes even more refined thanks to its "scars". This Japanese art of **kintsugi** teaches that broken objects are not something to hide but something to display with pride.

When a precious item falls and breaks into a thousand pieces, we may sadly and regretfully throw them away. Yet there is an alternative way of responding. Kintsugi highlights and enhances the breaks, thus adding value to the broken object. Kintsugi is literally golden ("kin") and repair ("tsugi").



This traditional Japanese art uses a precious metal – liquid gold, silver or lacquer dusted with powdered gold – to bring together the pieces of a broken pottery item and at the same time enhance the breaks. The technique joins fragments and gives them a new, more refined aspect. Every repaired piece is unique because of the randomness with which ceramics shatter and they are enhanced with the use of precious metals. These

ceramics are often worth more after repair than before they were broken.

The kintsugi technique suggests many things. Perhaps we shouldn't throw away broken objects. When an object breaks, it doesn't mean that it's no longer useful. Its breakages can become valuable. We should try to repair things because sometimes in doing so we obtain more valuable objects and the process of repair can be enriching. This is the essence of resilience. Our fault line can become our place of empowerment.

Each of us should look for a way to cope with traumatic events in a positive way, learn from negative experiences, take the best from them and convince ourselves that exactly these experiences make each person unique, and precious.

There is a popular television programme called 'The Repair Shop' where people are invited to bring along broken and tarnished objects which still have an emotional value to the owner. In the hands of experts these objects are transformed into full working order and something of their original shining quality, invariably reducing the owners to tears.

In these broken days and in our broken lives we tend to hide the broken pieces and look for hope amongst our fears.cont'd

St Mary's Church letter (cont'd) plus WI

In Galilee 2,000 years ago an expert in healing human lives came amongst us and brought the route to wholeness for the human condition. Where there was weakness he brought strength, where there was sadness he brought joy, where there was fear he brought hope, where there was isolation he brought friendship. He touched those who were sick and they were healed and he met with the outcasts and they felt valued. His Spirit lives on today as we face the challenges that modern living and this pandemic have brought us.

If you are feeling a little cracked this morning remember the name of this expert in restoration. His name is Jesus.

Goodby to Linda Ilott

On April 12th the village said goodbye to Linda, a very much-loved lady who was born in Harlington and lived here for the whole of her 97 years.

She leaves behind brother Keith, now living in Essex, son Rodney and his wife Doreen, 2 granddaughters Stephanie and Maxine, and 2 great grandchildren.

Linda was born Linda Webb at 9 Church Road, (now part of Strawplaiters Cottage) near the Brinklow's grocery shop which is now Bradshaw's Estate agents, and an early memory Rodney has of the house is a big fireplace where Grandpa and Grandma Stone kept a kettle constantly on the boil. The family later moved to a row of cottages near 6 Sundon Road, since demolished, and then on to 46 Westoning Road.

Linda met her future husband, Bert, when her friend, Margaret Stone's mother, used to take in washing for the soldiers based in the village and Bert used to collect it for them. Linda always asked when he was coming in next. Bert was from Croydon and served with the Searchlights Unit for the Royal Artillery stationed at Redhills farm. It is thought he guarded the Sundon Hills Training ground.

A lovely story of their courtship is that Bert was stationed in the searchlights battery unit and Linda used to visit him there. One night it is said that as she walked back in the dark he shone his light from Sundon Hills towards the village right to her home so that she travelled safely back on foot.



During the war Bert was captured in Crete and was a POW in Germany for 4 years. Linda waited for him and on repatriation he went to Guernsey and then back to Harlington to marry her at St Mary's Church, in 1945. Her father had died three years before in an accident, so she was given away by Margaret's dad, Charles Stone. Her sister Daphne, who died three years ago, was a bridesmaid and a bell ringer at the church at the time and was in the choir with two friends; Sylvia Bottoms (now deceased) and Pearl Everett (nee Brinklow) who still lives in the village.

Once married the couple moved in to Westoning Road with the rest of the family and later moved to their own home at 13 Wingate Road, living near Margaret Hull 'Aunty Margaret' as she is still known by the family, and later again, to a bungalow in Robinson Crescent.

Like many others locally Bert went to work at Vauxhall. Linda had a career for a while as a hairdresser and at George Kent munitions in Luton and AC Delco in Dunstable. She lost a little finger in a work accident working with bottles at Whitbread's bottling plant. She also worked down at the Lee's/Wood farm in Sundon Road, as did many in the village – a tractor used to pull into the village to take them to pick peas, potatoes etc.

In their later years, the couple moved to Orchard House which is where Linda stayed after Bert's death nearly a decade ago. They celebrated their diamond wedding anniversary in 2005 and she was very excited about the card from the Queen on that occasion.

Linda loved going out for fish and chips and travelling. In early years this involved caravan holidays to Great Yarmouth and Wey-

mouth with the granddaughters, and later, holidays with friends such as the Fleckneys in Spain, Italy and Yugoslavia. On a cruise in Cyprus relatives came across Welsh singer Bryn Yemm who sang with the Treorchy Male Choir and they brought back a tape of his – she loved one hymn in particular - How Great Thou Art. Another time they were all set to go to Jamaica for a wedding anniversary, but storms prevented them, and they went to Spain instead, where unfortunately they got flooded out anyway.

In recent years Linda loved her Soaps – especially Emmerdale. Her son tells of times when a phone call was cut short if a particular favourite was about to start! She also loved her budgies and owned four or five in succession. There were many escapades and tears over these leading to frantic phone calls to family when they got out or up to mischief. At Orchard house her final beloved pet Billy was allowed free reign of the apartment and loved to 'chat' to her. She kept in

touch with Sylvia Harris and they often talked on the phone about their respective budgie pets. In their early days there Orchard house was a lively place with evening shows, organ playing, sing songs, 'turns' and bingo.

Linda's cremation took place on May 7^{th.} Because of Covid 19 it was unattended but Linda's family plan to hold a memorial for family and friends once lockdown is over. Both sets of ashes will be scattered where they spent many a happy time together on Sundon Hills, which was Linda's wish.



Upper School and, as you may have seen, we 'live streamed' Ed Stevens (below) who kindly played at the War Memorial.

The reaction on the village Facebook group was lovely to see; thank you for all the encouraging posts; we received nearly 200 'likes' and 'loves'.



Although TFT is unable to meet face to face at the moment, we are hopeful that we will be able to get together in some form from September. We run from 8.15pm to 10pm on Friday evenings with a varied programme for girls and boys in school years 7 to 13. This includes various competitions with other local groups and trips away. We also meet mid-week for band practice providing free tuition for bugle, drums, bell lyre and cymbals. We are also looking for a drum major to lead the band from the front with our mace.

As well as leading the Remembrance Day parade we normally play at fetes and special events such as the anniver-

sary of the Harlington station opening a couple of years ago. Six members of our band joined with around 70 others last autumn for a tour of Normandy, during which we played at many of the major D-Day related sites including marching across Pegasus bridge! Our next tour has just been confirmed for October 2021, going to Holland to visit various places including Arnham. Help During Lockdown

We now have 40 or more extra volunteers in the village – the majority of these are recent and are residents who are home because of furloughing or not being able to work or because A levels are cancelled, schools closed etc.

We still cannot drive people to appointments because of social distancing rules but we have helped by getting in shopping, dropping off and collecting prescriptions from local doctors and the pharmacies in Toddington, Barton and Flitwick, doing errands around the village, collecting in parcels etc.

We've also mown lawns, paid paper bills, posted letters and walked dogs.

Since January we have completed nearly 200 jobs, but we have plenty of capacity for more and many of our volunteers are patiently waiting to help so please do call us!

One of the reasons we have capacity is that neighbours are doing a lot for each other in the village outside of formal volunteering which is wonderful. Also Sanjeev, Sunita and the team at The Shop have made a huge difference as they are willing to drop off shopping and are also happy to sort out payment now or later. Some of our residents in lockdown for 12 weeks are running out of cash and we now have special arrangements with Tesco to call and arrange payment by debit card over the phone and swipe. We can also organise cash in return for cheques.

Finally we've been helping with food parcels and buying items in cases of particular need. We have a small budget from the Ward Councillor's Grant Fund to support residents during Covid-19 so please let us know if you see a requirement for this.

Full Circle

About 5 years ago when I was tidying the garden I decided as I had too many Californian poppies I would throw them

out and then thought someone may like them for a small donation to raise funds for Brain Tumour Research, and that is where this plant sale started. Now in April 2020 life has become manic, despite extra time on my hands due to the lockdown. The pandemic has meant there have been more villagers and residents from nearby villages passing my house as they exercise and this has increased plant sales massively. I spent the Easter holidays pricking out, planting more seeds and trolling round my garden looking for plants growing in the wrong places, splitting and digging up plants (including the Californian Poppy hence I feel like I have gone "Full Circle") to meet the demand and interest.

The month of April has seen the highest total of donations since I began. YOU have helped to raise £555. I couldn't believe it and had to check a couple of times!! YOU have brought the total raised to date to £2947.04. With the garden centres closed and restrictions on travelling and shopping, villagers have told me it has been lovely to go for a purposeful walk and choose a plant or two to take home for their now tidy and organised garden. I don't think Harlington has ever looked more beautiful. This crisis has given us more time to care for our homes and gardens and the beautiful weather has encouraged us out into the fresh air and garden, which in turn has filled our time and helped us to weather this crisis. Something positive out of all the worry, anxiety and what feels like mayhem.

Since Easter I have been very fortunate to have received offers of help to stock the plant display, friends to help prick out plants, offers of plant pots and garden related items such as a ladybird bird feeder, compost bin, propagators and a Karcher power wash head (which is still available for a small donation). So thank you to all those folk who have helped. You have also spurred me on to tidy my garage which I have now converted into a greenhouse and potting shed to house all the seedlings and plants as well as my 3 grow houses and any window ledge in my house!!!
