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
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Letter from St Mary's Church

Dear Friends,

The Christian faith is not essentially about a building, a denomination, or an institution full of tradition. At its heart, Christianity is not a set of rules or a religious structure. The Christian faith is essentially about a "now" relationship with God through Jesus Christ and the essence of Christianity is not about the past but about right now.

Of course, faith has an important component that *remembers* the past. We have just been recalling the Birth of Jesus and marked it in the village with a Nativity Trail which many followed. We recall God's saving acts on the cross, for example. We remember what God has done for us in the past. But faith is only alive when it impels us to continue to live out our faith in the present, in the now. St. James said, "Faith without deeds is dead" (James 2:26).

Sometimes I find myself interrupting and starting to answer before someone has finished speaking. Oh, that is not good. But when we are tradition-bound, we do that to God. We stop listening because we assume we already know what he'll say and that he'll never say anything new in the future. We become presumptuous.

By our traditions we second-guess God about what he wants us to do tomorrow or about how he wants us to react to a situation we're faced with today. Dear friends, this is not just wrong, it is deadly!

The religious, tradition-bound Pharisees of Jesus' day resisted him more strongly than anyone else. And he didn't mince words when he confronted them. He said:

"Isaiah was right when he prophesied about you hypocrites; as it is written:

'These people honour me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me. They worship me in vain; their teachings are but rules taught by men.'

You have let go of the commands of God and are holding on to the traditions of men....You have a fine way of setting aside the commands of God in order to observe your own traditions!" (Mark 7:6-9)

Wow! What would Jesus say to our churches today? What would he say to me individually, what would he say to *you?*

Is your own personal faith focused primarily on the past, on the traditions of your upbringing? Or is it focused on God in the present, right now? Are you listening so hard to your past that you can't hear God in the present? Are you hard of hearing — spiritually? I strongly believe God longs to speak to you and me afresh today. He is a loving God and he longs to link with us.

Jesus wants to renew his personal relationship with you today, this week. Not just to get together to talk about old times, but to talk about today and the fresh new tomorrow, about your future. About the exciting plans he has for you in the new year. He longs to show us new ways.

We can never let the traditions we value become a substitute for a present day relationship with the living Christ, since the essence of the Christian gospel is that Jesus is alive today!

Can I encourage you to pray right now? That might sound silly but please give it a try. Just sit somewhere quiet and surrender a couple of minutes. Be sure to ask God what he wants you to think about and what he wants you to do today. Ask what he wants you to do in this New Year. Ask God to share with you his dreams and visions for you and share your dreams with God, too. As you discuss your dreams with the God of the Future, be assured he will guide and mature them.

Lord, I confess that sometimes I have confused traditions with present-day faith. I've coasted on the memories of the past and what I thought you were, while neglecting to earnestly seek you and your will for me in the here-and-now. Forgive me. Let me hear and enter fully into your New Year's plans for me. In Jesus' name, I pray. Amen.

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Harlington Hedgehogs



Happy New Year to you all and thank you for your efforts through 2020 in helping hedgehogs. We are now into a new year and hopefully a good one, not only for us but for the hedgehog population as well. I noticed a lot of the Christmas adverts featured a hedgehog, raising awareness of them, which is great! Please keep putting out extra food and fresh

water as this will be essential over the next few months. Although hedgehogs will be well into hibernation, they do still come out every now and then for food/water. Those that were particularly small before hibernating will most likely be the ones to come out, so keep an eye for small hedgehogs as they may need rescuing. Any under 400g will need to be taken to a Rescue Centre.

At the start of December I listened to a radio interview with the Hedgehog Preservation Society in regards to the road awareness signs that were due to help the hedgehog population. It was shocking to hear that in England, only 4 local Councils applied for the signs, all of which were declined due to lack of evidence of their requirement. This is very disappointing. I tried for a year to get these signs for Harlington, using the information you all provided of hedgehog sightings, but

the Council would not even apply for the signs. We have therefore, an alternative sign on three of our resident's private property, facing the road and I will be asking residents in key areas if further signs can be displayed.

I have heard on the Harlington Hedgehog Facebook page of residents making tunnels into their gardens for hedgehogs to gain access. This access is crucial for hedgehogs to roam around as many gardens as possible for food. This is something small but has a massive impact!

Story of a Pilgrimage: Harlington

The ancient practice of Pilgrimage seems to be enjoying a resurgence. The land used to be criss-crossed with ancient walking routes, such as the Icknield Way, for pilgrims to Canterbury and St Albans.

Whilst walking the John Bunyan Trail in 'micro' pilgrimages of one day, or overnight trips, at the end of 2020, I found myself "champing" on the stretch from Streatley to Harlington. Champing is where a church kindly lets pilgrims sleep on a floor, or in the churchyard, with pilgrims getting their dinner at a local hostelry. Thankfully permission was granted for my 'wild camp' in the churchyard and I chose the branch of an ancient Yew to hitch up the basha under which to sleep.



Why become a pilgrim? Why put yourself through such effort and sometimes hardship? There's a deep human urge to set out on journeys of discovery, to visit sacred sites like churches, ancient monuments, beauty spots, healing springs of water. It's a chance to slow down to the pace of a walking rhythm, to get away from distractions and even listen to the God who we find is speaking to us already - when we listen. Jesus himself invited his followers 'Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest.' Mark 6:31

What did I learn? You learn about LIFE on pilgrimage: enjoying the journey, rather than rushing to the destination as the sole 'achievement'. John Bunyan's life and amazing novel *Pilgrim's Progress* inspire me. In November 1660, warned that a warrant was out for his arrest, he didn't swerve from his calling to preach at Lower Samsell Farm. Brought before the local magistrate at Harlington House resulted in 12 years in Bedford gaol. Bunyan is still honoured in St Mary's church - a kind of reconciliation or vindication in a church that once persecuted him. Symbolically, a thick branch of the local Bunyan's Oak now supports a beautiful wooden altar table. There's even a stained glass window commemorating him.



HUMILITY & DEPENDENCE on others. Thirsty, I had to stop and knock on a door to ask for water. The householder kindly showed me the tap and trustingly left me to myself to drink. The kindness of strangers.

THE SIMPLE PLEASURES OF CREATION – enjoy them. Plucking sweet and bitter blackberries from hedgerows. Boiling up a cup of tea on my wood stove to the scent of wood smoke.

Innocent farm animals staring at me wide-eyed in curiosity. Looking out in wonderment from under my basha and seeing the stars in the vast dark sky.

Harlington Neighbourhood Help (HNH) started in May 2000 as a pioneer group for Bedfordshire with initial funding of £200, and at one point 80 volunteers.

We currently have 22 volunteers, drivers, and non-drivers.

The committee has 7 members including a Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, and Minutes Secretary. All are volunteers and are elected at the AGM each year.

What assistance do we give?


Our very first call was for a lift to the Post Office and received a £2 donation in November 2000. Now, 20 years later, we have completed over 200 jobs this year in the village to get people to appointments, collect prescriptions, or just to pop in for a cup of tea and a chat.

We also (pre lockdown) ran a quiz at Orchard House every Monday, lead the Walks for Health and organised Flittabus trips to shops in Flitwick, Ampthill and Milton Keynes.

Transport requests are for anyone who has difficulty using local public transport. We use DBS checked **volunteer drivers** who wait during the appointment, and are reimbursed at 45p per mile. We always need more drivers.

Most very local journeys are currently free, thanks to donations.

Harlington Remembers...

Continuing Russell Preston's article from November...

Rationing was not to much of a problem in the country. Food was shared between families. Currants and raisins were obtained for a Spotted Dick or Rice Pudding from the army cook house tent. The odd pig, lots of vegetables and fruit were given in return. Ralph Kent got the kitchen scraps for his pigs. A Sherman tank crashed into Ethel Stone's house at the top of Sundon Road. Local girls married troops stationed nearby. The old brickworks on the Sharpenhoe Road, now Lovett Green, were turned into an engineering and munitions works (shadow factories) to help the war effort. The cement works at Houghton Regis and Sundon ran 24/7, despite interruption from the Luftwaffe. A Doodle Bug landed in the stream narrowly missing the factory in Sharpenhoe Road.

On 19th June, 1943, a Miles Magister from Barton Airfield crash landed to the west of the parish at Wick Hearne. Old farm machinery was left in the middle of various fields to prevent enemy planes landing and broken machinery was left at Upper East End Green in order to block the road should the Germans invade.

Many villagers served second time around in the ARP, Home Guard or as Special Constables. Women were officially allowed to take part in the war effort. Nellie Nicholls and Mary Preston (known as Silvy) both worked at the Telephone Exchange in Luton. At least one villager made uniforms at the Eastex factory, Luton. Many locals were employed at Vauxhall, Commers and Kents, even hat factories were turning out uniforms. Veteran, Fred Baker and his wife Lily, helped organize the A.R.P. and Home Guard. Lily also attended WVS meetings in Bedford. Mrs Tabor and her family at The Manor played a big part in training exercises for the Home Guard, and first aid practices took place in the school and Training Room at The Manor (Harlington House). Ernie Huckle Jnr assisted the Home Guard in laying a landline between Toddington and Harlington. According to the memoirs of evacuee, Bernard Poulten, a small hut was placed on Bury Orchard near the church to store Home Guard equipment. One windy night the hut blew away leaving just the racks housing the equipment. The Vicarage and The Manor seemed to be stop off places for the Home Guard and ARP during long nights of duty. Some Harlington ladies joined the Land Army and the nearest hostel was at Toddington Park. The wives of various post holders were substitutes in case the officer was called away. Len Stone was employed as a Marshall and driven around in a Jeep. He was allowed into the planning hut situated in Sundon Road between Wood Farm and the entrance to Dyers Hall Farm. He gave advice to the operation planners regarding which roads to close and divert traffic. Across the road from the hut a pheasant's nest was discovered, some of the eggs were eaten for breakfast the next morning. (Ssh don't tell Cyril Lee!) Village ladies from the WI and WVS were busy providing refreshments and some were called up into the various services including the ATS. In 1940, on a good clear night one could see the bright lights of the capital from Bury Orchard receiving attention from the Luftwaffe.

If red flags were flying in Sharpenhoe and Harlington, army trucks occasionally provided transport for older children to various schools.

Harlington Remembers... (cont'd)

After the Conflict:

The German pilot, Hardy Voight, who parachuted down by the factory became friends with his capturers, Jack Peppiatt and Joe West. Hardy became a Typewriter Mechanic in Wilhelmshaven after the War. Sgt Arthur Baker died in 1949 from a leg injury sustained in the RAF during the war. Many Harlington young men were conscripted into the forces just after the conflict. Pte Derek Lawman enlisted in early 1945, died in June 1946, in Salonika, Greece. Many evacuees and their families visited the village in peacetime. A committee was set up to refurbish the War Memorial in the late 1950s. From the photographs taken, most of the village attended the commemoration service. Local builder, Martin Dove helped to organise the work. Martin died in 1968 from cirrhosis of the liver after drinking contaminated water (Liver Fluke) many years earlier in the Libyan Desert during the war.

Letters regarding Harlington Parish Council

Perhaps it would be a good idea to let us all know what is being proposed in the Paperchain.
