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# Letter from Rev. Nigel Washington, St. Mary's

### Dear Friends,

It is the season of remembrance when we particularly remember those we have loved but see no longer, when we honour those who fought in world wars, when we also remember Guy Fawkes and at the end of the month that the Advent of Christ's birth is before us. It is good to remember and this was brought to mind recently when I visited a friend who has recently been afflicted with dementia. He



was so sadly mixed up in his remembering, everything was confusing and I found it all very upsetting. As my visit continued I was pleased that we were able to share some memories that our shared times had given us but in truth my friend was lost in a bewildering fog.



A recent Bible reading in church included the parable of the lost sheep- 'Suppose one of you had a hundred sheep and lost one. Wouldn't you leave the ninetynine in the wilderness and go after the lost one until you found it?' When found, you would be sure to put it across your shoulders, rejoicing, and when you got home call in your friends and neigh-

bours, saying, 'Celebrate with me! I've found my lost sheep!' (Luke 15:4-6, The Message version)

I love Jesus' parables - great stories, succinct, memorable, accessible and always with a telling message. I can imagine his hearers pondering them, just as Jesus wanted, coming back to ask him questions.

While the parable of the lost sheep has a nice feel to it, it's not uncommon in Yorkshire and the Lakes to find stray sheep on the roadside, often munching away quite happily, and one might be forgiven for wondering how quickly the owners actually miss them. Quite quickly is the answer in fact, if the example of John Benson of Skelwith Fold Farm is anything to go by. Described as a hero on the front page of the Westmorland Gazette, John went into three feet of water in a flooded river to rescue over 30 of his flock. An extreme situation certainly but one revealing great commitment on his part.

Jesus concluded the parable with the words 'Count on it, there's more joy in

heaven over one sinner's rescued life than over ninety-nine good people in no need of rescue.'

And he would know - offering spiritual help and rescue was, and still is, Jesus' front line and therefore the church's too.

Jesus remembers each one of us, we are important to him and he asks us to remember him too. Let's do that in this season of remembrance.



### Hedgehogs

As the leaves start to fall and the weather turns colder, it is a vital time for hedgehogs, working hard to fatten up throughout autumn, ready for their long winter sleep. It's really tempting to be tidy and remove all the fallen autumn leaves, but you'll be robbing a hedgehog of a cosy nest. Some late born hedgehogs may be too small to hibernate so early and may continue to forage for food well into Winter. So, leaving the leaves is good as they can find all those yummy bugs to eat within them.

Before the next edition, we will be having bonfire night, so please check wood-

piles before lighting them... It is recommended before lighting any bonfire, that you completely move the pile to check for hedgehogs and other animals because a bit of poking about will only make them curl up and hide more.

Keep putting food and water out, take care of animals during bonfire celebrations and keep a messy area of your garden to give hedgehogs a home!!

Thankyou also for those who have donated plants. I have received strawberry plants, ajuga, grasses, buddleia, honeysuckle, periwinkle and forget me not today to name but few. It is always worth coming to take a look as there are always surprises both for me to admire and for you to make donations for.

I have been trying to build stock for this autumn and next year. I have a few pansies left, spring flowering plants, my wallflowers are beginning to get stronger and will be available I hope over half term. I have some small Christmas box which has a beautiful perfume in the winter, lovely black berries, super waxy leaf and pretty flowers, now one of my favourites. I have harvested 2 of my sunflower heads which are easily 12 inches in diameter to save some seed so you can all have some of these spectacular flowers next summer. I also harvested some echinacea seed heads and have sown them they have a burnt orange centre and pink petals, quite spectacular. Aquilegia are also available and senecio, I hope if they take, all quite exciting!

I still plan to sell Brain Tumour Research Christmas cards from my house; they remain the same price as last year 10 cards for £4.50 and I will have them ready to sell at the beginning of November. I will plan to put up my gazebo in my front garden on Saturday 13th November so you can view the designs that are available and purchase some if you so wish. I will also attempt to provide tea and coffee if you would like to tarry a while, outdoors of course, but chance to meet so let's hope the weather is kind to us. House plants have moved indoors as the days and nights get colder but will also be available on the 13th as well as all the garden plants, of course. ### St Mary's Church



**Churchyard:** Walking up to the church in mid September, movement to the side of the path stopped me in my tracks. I had nearly walked on top of the nests



of underground nesting bees!! There were 100s of bees all flying around, just above the ground. They were fascinating, especially their neat little "doors" - holes with a small mound of soil around the edges. It was funny watching them as each one took quite a while to locate their own nest, stopping many times in the wrong place and then moving on again. I wanted to find out what they were and of the many descriptions I read, the closest was for the **IVY BEE** – only active between Sept and November. Their primary food source is the pollen from ivy flowers. They are solitary bees and dig their nests in large gatherings, sometimes in the thousands. The area they've chosen in the churchyard

fits their preference for soil that is sandy, fairly loose and south facing. The Ivy bee was first recorded in the UK in 2001 and can now be found in much of southern England. Whether the bees will still be there when you read this I'm not sure, but you'll probably be able to see where they've nested. Please stay on the path leading to the main door, and you'll also see the signs. Do you know why honey bees stay in their hive in winter? Swarm!

**Remembrance Exhibition:** Sunday  $14^{th}$  November in the Parish Hall from 11.20am until 5pm – it will open after the memorial and church services end. Lots of interesting information mostly about WW11, but also WW1, pictures of the Home Guard and other photos not displayed before. There will be a newspaper with local stories about the war – a few copies available to buy or you'll be able to order one. Refreshments from 12 noon include Harlington pasties, numbers limited, first come first served! Cakes, tea and coffee.

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### **November Celebrations**

4<sup>th</sup> Diwali - Diwali is the Hindu festival of Lights, which is celebrated with fireworks, decoration and feasting. Diwali is the middle day of the five day festival. The exact date is dependent on the Hindu lunar calendar.

5<sup>th</sup> Guy Fawkes - also known as "Bonfire Night" -The day we celebrate Guy Fawkes' failure to blow

up the Houses of Parliament in an attempt to kill the king. Traditionally celebrated with a bonfire, burning a "guy" and fireworks. More recently this has been less celebrated as fireworks and fireworks displays have been reduced for safety reasons, and as we have imported the American Halloween tradition of "Trick or Treat" (as opposed to our own traditions of telling ghost stories) which has been much easier for the shops to commercialise with the sale of costumes, pumpkins and sweets!

11<sup>th</sup> Remembrance Day - Originally Armistice Day when the Great War ended, after the Second World War it became a time to remember the dead of both wars, and this has subsequently been extended to cover the dead of all wars.


14<sup>th</sup> Remembrance Sunday - The Sunday closest to Remembrance day. Used for parades and church services of remembrance.

28<sup>th</sup> Nov to 6th Dec 2021 Hanukkah - The Jewish holiday commemorating the rededication of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem at the time of the Maccabean Revolt against the Seleucid Empire. Alexander the Great conquered territory from Egypt to India, but died in India. His empire was divided between his generals. Judea originally was part of the Egyptian section, under the Ptolemies, but was

later taken over by the Seleucids. Where the Ptolemies were tolerant of the Jewish religion, the Seleucids were not, and Antiochus IV Epiphanes tried to suppress the Jews and have a statue of himself put in the Temple, leading to the Maccabean revolt.

28<sup>th</sup> Advent Sunday - the start of the (solemn) season of Advent, where the church prepares for Christmas.

30<sup>th</sup> St. Andrew's Day - St Andrew is the patron saint of Scotland.

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
