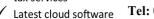

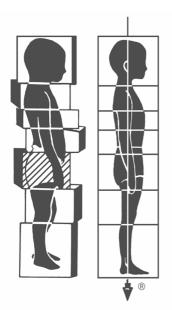

Letter from the Life Church

As I write this letter the country is mourning the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. In my previous letter a few months ago I focused on the Queen and her handbag as she had filmed an amazing sketch with Paddington Bear, shown on TV at the beginning of the celebrations held to mark her 70 years on the throne. It was an opportunity where different aspects of her character shone through, not only humour and acting skills, (not easy when Paddington was not actually sitting in front of her) but also her love for her people, joining in the celebrations with the nation, as she had also demonstrated at the opening of the London Olympics in 2012 as she met James Bond.

It was a week where we have welcomed a new prime minister and a new king, Charles III, a significant time in history. As most of us have only know Queen Elizabeth on the throne, it will be a major adjustment for individuals, the country and the Commonwealth.

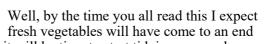

Planting Pants at Warden Abbey Vineyard

Community vineyard Warden Abbey Vineyard have been hosting a range of events and activities to benefit Bedfordshire citizens, including students from St John's Special School

It's been a busy year so far at Warden Abbey Vineyard, and the summer of activities are in full swing. Based between Old Warden and Cardington, Warden Abbey Vineyard is a hidden gem just waiting to be explored.

Bedfordshire Rural Communities Charity has leased the vineyard since 2010, and developed it as a unique resource for the



local community. Throughout the year, staff and volunteers are kept busy with jobs such as pruning the dormant vines, stripping leaves from fruit zones, and harvesting grapes.

Since 2017 a group of students from St John's Special School have been visiting the vineyard over 6-7 weeks to work with the vineyards volunteer 'mentors' on a range of tasks. The students visibly gained in confidence and learned new skills, as did the volunteers, and true bonds were built which lasted the whole of the length of the project. After a successful first year, the school have been coming back ever since.

Five students took part this year and were kept busy planting new vines, weeding and watering, as well as growing sunflowers and building bug hotels. The students got involved in a unique way, with a #Plantyourpants activity acting as a fun method of testing life in the soil. On their first day, the students buried some cotton pants to dig up again on their last day. The more the pants had decomposed over the weeks, the better the life in the soil.

The vineyard has also been building links with Biggleswade Adult Centre. During the planting days in May, a couple of their service users came to help plant vines. The vineyard planting days saw other Vineyard volunteers and Ivel Valley Conservation Partnership volunteers come together to prepare the vines for a busy summer of activity.

Not only is the vineyard used as a community and educational resource, but the grounds are also used to for other activities such as yoga and art sessions.

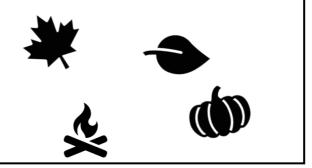
please let me know, and I will make sure it is available to see.

Self Care with BRCC

Taking a walk outside is known to help lift the spirits, and has real benefits to both body and mind. In fact, research shows that spending just two hours a week in nature can help us feel happier and healthier. Being outside in nature can have a calming and restorative effect, helping us to reduce stress. It can also help bring some relief to mental health conditions such as anxiety and depression.

And the best part is that getting outside in nature is free and available to all. Nature is everywhere!

Promoting health and wellbeing in communities is at the heart of Beds RCC's work. This is one of the reasons that we are promoting National Self Care Week running November 14th until November 20th – whose theme is Exercise Care for Life.

Going out for a walk is something we can do to look after ourselves. And as the nights begin to close in, some of us may need to give ourselves that extra bit of self-care.

Beds RCC offers Wellbeing Walks across Bedfordshire - free, regular walks open to all. They are aimed particularly at people who are presently doing little or no exercise. They usually last from 60 to 90 minutes, though there are also some shorter 'beginners' walks. (See opposite for Harlington)

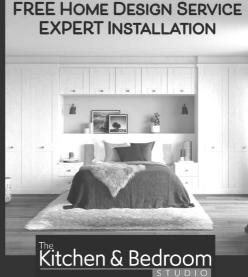

Roads and Traffic Correspondence

In response to the piece in last issue of Contact (re traffic speeds), I have to counter argue that CBC are the culprits of an abomination in this village (supported by the Parish Council, it has to be said) in the form of existing road humps that have not actually calmed any traffic, as they have been put in places where traffic did not need calming in the first place; at considerable expense to your council tax and parish share.

Then look at the pavement replacement in Church Road - how did that get passed for payment? Then the re-tarmac of the road surface in Church Road, which did not need doing. And new housing next to the railway, which is an eyesore and has not been planned or developed in keeping with the village, nor is it being managed. I want CBC as far away from my village as they can go.

Do vehicles need to go slower through the village? Possibly. How do we do this?

How many people reading this have driven through picturesque villages in England, where you naturally slow down to take in the scenery and the ambience; and where there is a sign, which states "Please drive carefully through our village" and you do.

I would suggest that we make the village more attractive to passers through, so drivers slow down, traffic calming measures that restrict the road width at various points, with attractive planters, street furniture or varied blockwork or dry stone walling.

Let's return to a zebra crossing with a Belisha beacon, cars always slow down for these; different colour tarmac alerts a driver to a change in road conditions. There must be other simple, less obtrusive measures than road humps that retain the beauty and aesthetics of the village; let's be creative; and then remove the road humps.

When the contractors were re-surfacing Church Road, they said that the road markings that were there before would be replaced. This has not happened.

The median line (down the middle of the road) has not been replaced and I have personally had 3 near misses with vehicles (coming from the cross-roads) around the blind bend at the church where the on-coming motorists have had a quaint idea of what constitutes their half of the road.

May I ask that either Beds CC or Central Beds replace the white line near the church at least, and if they cannot, the parish pay for it. I fear there will be a nasty if not. 50m of white line would not cost a fortune.
