Letter from the Life Church

In December 2022 we had a new addition to our family, a kitten. This was unexpected and unplanned. Our previous cat had passed away just a few weeks previously and we had decided to wait before we took on another pet but following a discussion with a local gentleman who had kittens he wanted to settle into new homes, a purchase was made.



Bella, the kitten has brought us lots of fun and enjoyment over the past few months. She is a pretty grey colour with yellow eyes and black whiskers. She always wants to climb to the highest place possible and doesn't like anything to be left on a table or shelf. We have a dish with pebbles and shells surrounding a candle and she will continually come and route out the shells knocking them to the floor.

She stayed in the home for the first months of her life, having only experienced the great outdoors through the safety of a window or from a cat basket on her trips to the vet. On the chosen day we opened the patio doors and waited, expecting her to go running outside ready to explore the unknown. She just sat at the threshold and looked, unsure and very hesitant. She eventually went out onto the patio when we went and sat outside with a cup of tea to enjoy a bit of warm sunshine. She stayed with us and would only follow Pete when he went further into the garden. She continues to always be around us in the garden and not keen to explore any further, she loves jumping up and trying to catch flies but always runs back to find where we are.

Watching and enjoying the journey with Bella reminds me of my journey with God. I can clearly remember the day I stepped out from working within a hospital setting with all the security it has and people around to help me in my role as a nurse, into working within a community setting where you visit alone and go into unknown places. Life has its times when we have to step out into the unknown. It maybe a new job, a new school, a situation you have never experienced before. It can feel very overwhelming, lonely and difficult to take that first step.

I often think and reflect on the story of Joshua, where he is often told by God to be strong and courageous and step out as he wasn't alone. Joshua had seen that God had been with Moses and he would be with him. I experience the closeness of God as I walk through my life in all situations and I know he will be with me in whatever the future holds.

Let's all encourage each other with stories of what God has done and how we have experienced him. As with Bella, she has the confidence to explore the garden as she knows we are there with her. We can step out in our journey with con-




I have noticed yet a further eyesore at our local railway station.
