

How it all began



One afternoon in March, a number of 'Contact' Distributors came together for the annual 'catch-up and cuppa'. I had some old magazines, including the very first one dated June 1977, to show them.

Clive has asked me many times to write about the start of 'Contact' and I thought it rather appropriate to begin now because, in June 1977 we were celebrating the Queen's Silver Jubilee. James Preston, the Chairman of the Parish Council,

wrote for it a short article and concluded with this: "Let's enter into the spirit of the occasion and wave the flag and fly the colours of this OUR Special Day". I looked forward to doing just that for the Coronation.

It was in the summer of 1976 when St Mary's Church was in the middle of an interregnum, just as it is today. An interregnum is a time when the church does not have a leader, this can last up to 12 months and so members of the Parish Parochial Council (PCC) work together with the Church Wardens to keep the church going. I had been a member of the church for four years and not on the PCC at that time. I was one of the Friday Club (Sunday School) teachers and a leader of a Bible Study Group. One Friday morning I was on my way to get some vegetables from Sylvia Giles when I met with another member of the church. She said it was a pity I had not been at some event on Wednesday. I replied that if I had known about it I would have been there. So it seemed that for the umpteenth time information was not being passed on. Those of you with mobile phones and the ability to text or phone wherever you are 24 hours a day will perhaps not understand what it was like to only have house phones and paper as means of communication; before the 1990s events and meetings could easily slip through the net without you being there. I digress, to return to my story -



As I walked away towards Sundon Road a thought dropped into my mind about a Village Magazine. Wouldn't it be wonderful to have a village magazine which was for everyone? As I pondered this thought more and more I began thinking about all the groups in the village that could be included, - WI., Book Club, Scouts, Youth Club, Sports Association, Lower School to name a few. All sharing their achievements, date and times of events which would be of interest to many.

I began to get very excited about the thought of this village magazine and ideas kept flooding in. I had no idea how it could be achieved but I shared the idea

with my husband, Derek and a couple of very good friends, Geoff and Kathy Webster. Go for it they said, get all the information you can so that you can present it to the Harlington Christian Council (HCC), (now Churches Together in Harlington.

During that summer I collected all the village magazines I could get my hand on and visited some editors in Barton-le-Clay, Silsoe and Toddington, asking for their advice. By the autumn I had a mock-up of a magazine in an A5 folder. I had spent a lot of time with Kathy Webster praying and discussing the magazine, constantly doubting myself and what I was doing. After many months, I said to Kathy, "do you really think this is something God wants me to do" and she replied, "Well, if you don't know now you never will!". So with her encouragement I shared what I had been doing with one of the Church Wardens, John Rutherford and requested time with the PPC to share the details and to ask if it should be presented to the HCC as a joint venture.

Eventually, I was told that I could attend the end of a PPC meeting, which I did at the end of 1976. I took my folder with the mock-up and talked to the PPC about the magazine. They were all very interested but said how is this going to be funded? Fortunately, I had done some sums and was able to say that our costs would be covered if we sold 300 copies at 5p a copy and the advertisements on the inside of the front and rear cover would pay for the printing of the cover (30 two or 3-lined adverts). The magazine itself could be printed by the Roneo machine in the Vicarage. Everyone was enthusiastic but still felt that money was required to launch the magazine. There was a lot of discussion about the cost and whether the Methodist Church would agree and I was beginning to feel after 30 mins that this venture would not get off the ground. Yet, I was certain that it had been an inspired idea and not mine! Finally, the treasurer, Jim Thacker, said that he thought it was a great idea and if the Methodist Church were not willing to be part of it then St Mary's should support it, BUT... that I should wait until a new vicar was appointed and share it with him Vicky Yorke See Part 2 later ...

Here we are again getting ready for the July contact. We are half way through 2023, doesn't time fly! You are keeping me very busy trying to keep stocks up as you visit and

spread the word to your families, friends and neighbours. I have met some lovely people who come from far and wide and make return visits from Luton, Greenfield, Toddington and Barton and probably a whole lot of other places that I don't know as I am unable to be here for everyone who visits. A special "Thank you" to my neighbour Gill who kept it all alive and watered at the beginning of June so I could attend my brother's wedding in Horncastle. I was flabbergasted as we opened the door and there was in excess of £58 donated for plants in 5 days. So far this year £795.34 has been raised for plants from my doorstep. For the past 5 weeks I have taken 2 crates of plants on a Wednesday to my school that I retired from and where I now do volunteer gardening: 1 of flowers and 1 of vegetables and £101.30 has been raised, so thank you everyone for supporting and thank you to all those people who drop off their excess plants and those who pot on and grow specifically to support my efforts; I really do appreciate your help. I would also like to thank Duncan for sharing 5 bags of his homemade compost this has been a huge help as you can imagine I get through quite a bit of compost. I joined "The Seed Box" Flitwick Allotment Association about 8 weeks ago and I have bought at least 12 75 litre bags from them, so this is a welcome gift.

I am hoping to take some plants down to the lower school for their summer fete on the 1st and also to the flower and vegetable show on the 26th August so I hope to see some of you there or plants are available from 132 Goswell End Road 24/7, 7 days a week.

On a final note I just would like to give you a smile: Betty kindly phoned to offer me some Alchemilla Mollis and red hot pokers, life was a bit busy at the time so I managed to collect and pot up the red hot pokers but the Alchemilla stayed in her green bag, June made one of her regular visits and knocked asking if I had any Alchemilla so it was duly transferred to another bag and never did get potted up at 132 or make it to the front of the house it just got passed from Betty to June via me, we were all happy and the charity benefitted from this swopsy plant sharing, who would ever think! And yes, the green bag and red hot poker bucket were duly returned to Betty for any further contributions, thank you both. Till August Contact, keep gardening!





<u>Churchyard</u>: to our delight, we have a ground nesting bumble bees' nest in the churchyard, marked by a sign on the right hand side as you go through the main arched gate. The bees are docile and would need to feel threatened before stinging anyone (the males have no sting), so do go and watch them as they lead their busy lives. Our ground nesting solitary bees should return when the ivy flowers appear, maybe late August, or early September. Meanwhile, the lady's bedstraw flowers are starting to appear in our wild grassland area, although not flowering at the time of writing. Do visit the churchyard to enjoy the wildlife and trees, (and enjoy some shade in the hot weather). Just walk around the outside of any 'wilder' areas, and please use the benches which are dotted around.
