



#### What is Paganism

Pagans worship the divine in many different forms, through feminine as well as masculine imagery and also without gender. The most important and widely recognised of these are the God and Goddess whose annual cycle of procreation, giving birth, and dying defines the Pagan year.

Paganism strongly emphasises equality of the sexes. Women play a prominent roll in the modern Pagan movement, and Goddess worship features in most Pagan ceremonies.

Paganism is a growing faith with numbers recorded in the November 2022 census of 74,000.

In medieval times the main talking point of the faith was of course Witchcraft, but let us move away from the imagery of an old lady with warts on her nose, transported by a broomstick and a black cat hanging on for dear life.

Witches or Wise women as they were known, were the NHS of the time, with their immense knowledge of plants and natural healing which was handed down from mother to daughter . Most were the midwives of the day offering plant remedies to ease the pain of childbirth and other ailments.

But as we know if things went wrong, they would be called Witches and they would face the wrath of the judiciary and possible death.

Many of those mentioned would of course be old and defenceless, I do hope that such a scenario would never happen again but who knows.


