Letter from the Methodist Minister

" I haven't reached the finish line yet... But I continue my race... I forget what's behind me and I rush towards what's in front of me. (Philippians 3, 12-15)

Dear brothers and sisters,

another year is over, the Christmas holidays are over... Our life resumes its daily rhythm, with work, commitments, many problems set aside for a while.

Volunteer work in our village and work in different churches also resumes. Restart our journey to support Harlington and all those who live here and far from here. At the end of the year we raised funds through a concert to build an organ for a church in Sri-Lanka... there are many initiatives that start from here.

Many different groups also work separately, collaborating for the good of all.

To use the expression of the apostle Paul, our race begins again. We all together and separately think about the need to protect the nature that surrounds our village, we think about the elderly and people in difficulty through various initiatives.

The apostle Paul compares his life as a believer to an athlete's race to the finish line. He doesn't believe he can do it alone as happens to any athlete who, taking part in a race, can only count on himself, on his skill and speed, so reaching the finish line depends only on him and a bit of luck, he trusts in God.



And he feels that he needs God's help, without which he could never reach the goal. But the goal of a non-believer is no less, I have seen in my life a lot of commitment even on the part of non-believers who have given time and effort to others, to peace, to non-violence, to justice and to nature. I learned a lot from the secular environment which is sometimes much busier than the ecclesiastical one.

We can apply this image of the race that the apostle uses to our lives as believers and non-believers because we are all engaged in the same race.

Faced with this new year that has just begun, perhaps there is someone in our village who does not intend to participate, someone else who already feels tired or the weight of the commitment; someone else who doesn't expect anything because they are convinced that everything is always the same, that every year is the repetition of things already done, already said, already seen, already experienced... But many others are certainly waiting for the start of many initiatives also linked to charity, to the uniform groups with joy and enthusiasm, because they do not feel the commitment as a burden but as an opportunity for growth and solidarity.

Friends in our race we need everyone.

No one should fall behind, stop, stand on the sidelines or retreat.

No one should think that they are inadequate, secondary or weak, like some athletes who compete thinking that others are more skilled, faster and that they will never cross the finish line.

It is not so. We all have gifts and we must all respond, with our commitment, service and testimony.

For this reason, no one should feel discouraged, tired, disheartened or inadequate...

May we all start our race together in this new year, united by joy and enthusiasm for the good of our neighbours, our environment and our village so dear to our hearts!

Harlington Neighbourhood Help (HNH) started in May 2000 as a pioneer group for Bedfordshire with initial funding of £200 and 80 volunteers.

We currently have 22 volunteers, most of them drivers, but we also have nondrivers as we help with forms, prescription collections, shopping etc.

We have had over 400 'jobs' this year in the village.

Transport requests are for anyone who has difficulty using local public transport, but tend to come from some of our older residents. They are driven by DBS checked **volunteer drivers** who wait during the appointment, and are currently offered reimbursement at the rate of 45p per mile. We always need more drivers. Most local journeys are currently completely free thanks to donations.

Our committee has 7 members including a Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, and Minutes Secretary. All are volunteers and are elected at the AGM each year.

And we are off again 2024 has begun but first let's round up 2023.

So my last total given to you was in the December Contact but I am proud, thrilled and amazed to say we left 2023 having raised a total of £50,408.48. It had been my dream and hope to reach £50,000 but I honestly thought it was unrealistic so the moral of the story is to dream. Thank you all so much for making it come true.

The total raised in the sale of cards and merchandise was a mighty $\pounds 1204.85$. The total raised in plant sales from outside my house in 2023 is $\pounds 1700.11$ and I think that is a record, I will check that and report in a later edition of Contact.

The White Hart, Newport Pagnell hosted a fundraiser for Brain Tumour on 10th December where I raised £101 selling my plants, it was a lot of hard work but I met lovely people and the whole event was organised by the very enthusiastic Emma Jolly, Community Fundraiser for Brain Tumour Research. It was a lovely way to raise funds and to get in the Christmas spirit: there were art and craft workshops, a visit from Father Christmas, carol singers, an opportunity for Christmas present shopping with a crochet bag stall, pottery stall, limited prints, Jewellery, body shop products and many others. There were free refreshments including a traditional hog roast and entrance to the event was free, I would recommend it, so if it is organised next year I will give you all more notice, I can't offer a lift because my car will be packed to the gills with plants!

My Christmas card delivery service was a bit of a damp squib, but it was planned a little late on my part, so I hope to try it one more time next year and give you a bit more notice but thank you Mary for encouraging me and letting me try it out and for your very generous donation to the charity.

Finally in 2023 we have been able to arrange Tiles of Hope. The charity will



provide a tile for every £2740 raised. Here is one of the tiles we will place at the Queen Mary hospital, London. We will have the opportunity to meet one of the scientists and visit one of the centres of excellence. So hopefully more to report on in a later edition of Contact.

2024 New Year's Day Walk

This year several potential walkers had told me that 5 miles was too far for them so I decided to try a new format with 2 walks, a normal one of 5 miles & a shorter one of half that distance. I decided that the first section of both walks would be identical so at 11 o'clock on New Year's Day 16 walkers set off from the Village Hall car park, we walked along the pavements of Barton Road with a clear view of Sharpenhoe Clappers to the right & then a descent down the VERY muddy bridleway down to Willow Farm. We soon arrived at the Bottoms Road which we walked along for a while before turning off over a plank bridge. After passing a couple of apple trees we crossed a substantial bridge over the mill stream. Here we turned right to follow the brook to the next bridge where we stopped to have a photo & a drink & for the 2 parties to split.



Tony Price led the larger group on the longer walk parallel to the brook before turning right just before the new footbridge. They followed field tracks back to the Bottoms Road, back to the concrete bridge & hence along the footpath back to Bury Orchard. I led the smaller group doing the shorter walk. We crossed the bridge & almost immediately crossed another bridge. This led to a footpath leading back to the Bottoms Road which we followed for a short distance before taking the path over the concrete bridge & hence back to Bury Orchard. This path was extremely waterlogged with a great deal of mud. I felt that the walk this year was the muddiest that I have ever walked & it makes me wonder if it is worth carrying on the tradition of the Harlington New Year's Day walk.

Flittabus Ctd.

CBC is not consulting on, or intending to, prevent concessionary bus pass users travelling before 9.30am. They will be able to travel before 9.30am should they wish.

CBC is not reducing the concessionary fare subsidy. What it is doing, as per government legislation, is returning to the practice of reimbursing bus operators for the actual number of journeys taken so they are no better and no worse off. As part of the post-Covid recovery, the government encouraged local authorities to provide reimbursement for journeys that were never taken, based on the higher pre-Covid passenger numbers. The government's position is to return to payments based on actual usage.

Furthermore, CBC is not considering removing funding to Community Transport at all in this budget.


Harlington Lower School plus Quiz






