

Letter from St. Mary's Church

April this year is unusual in that Easter is already behind us. Did you know that there is an Act of Parliament that says that Easter Day must be "on the first Sunday after the second Saturday in April" (Easter Act 1928 section 1)? But, as you know, this year Easter Day was on 31st. March, so this is another example of one of those many Acts of Parliament that has never been implemented. I am intrigued to know why the Act was passed in the first place, since it was obvious that the church was going to raise strong objections, for the date of Easter has always been traditionally fixed by reference to the lunar cycles of the Jewish calendar. Incidentally, the Orthodox Church calculates Easter by the Julian calendar which means this year the Orthodox Church Easter will be celebrated on Sunday, 5th May. How confusing!

What is not confusing is the Easter message. At Easter we celebrate the risen Christ who suffered agonisingly for us, who died for us, and gave us the wonderful gift of eternal life. He offers hope for humankind. That message is needed more and more in a world in which there is so much agony and suffering. In the weeks after Easter (or of Easter), our readings at St. Mary's from the Acts of the Apostles remind us of those gallant early Christians who shared the good news despite ex-



treme hostility and persecution, who shared all that they had with each other, and who demonstrated that Jesus was alive and was with them in all that they did. No wonder they achieved the astonishing success of growing from a small Jewish sect into a global faith.

This year in the Anglican church, the weeks in April and the first part of May are officially the seven weeks of Easter when we can celebrate wholeheartedly the good news of the resurrection. In St. Mary's, we have a particular additional cause for celebration with the announcement that the Rev. Mark Edwards will soon be joining us as Priest-in-Charge of the Benefice of Harlington, Tingrith and Westoning. We pray for him and his family as they move from Gravesend, in the Rochester diocese, to their new home in Westoning vicarage. Mark starts in June, so if you want to meet him, why not come along to a service then?

Christine Ward



Christine Ward, was born on the 14th July 1940 in Port Glasgow and went to Clune Park school, then to Port Glasgow High. She was brought up with her grandparents. She started work two weeks before her 15th birthday in the May Pole Store in Port Glasgow where she worked on the butcher's counter.

She was a Sunday school teacher and sung in the choir. She was also an assistant girl guide leader.

Her Granny, who she was very close to, died in 1955 and she came on holiday to England for the first time in the August of 1956 and really enjoyed it.

She left Scotland in January 1962 with her mum, step dad and her sister Anne and moved into Sundon Road Harlington. Nanny then went to work in Luton's May Pole Store until September 1962 when she left to go to Sainsburys. She joined the Harlington Methodist chapel as a Sunday school teacher in 1962.

For her job at Sainsbury's, Nanny had to go to Blackfriars in London to do some work related training for 3 weeks and was asked to show her trainer a chump chop – she nearly failed her course as she only knew these as Jigots! (Still not sure what either of these are.) She did pass the course and went onto work on the butchers counter until 1967.

Nanny was quite mischievous in her youth although many of you who knew her wouldn't have thought that. She snuck out one night to go to bingo in Luton with her friend Julie Dyke but didn't tell her mum or stepdad. This was the night she met Grandad, on the first Sunday that he came out of the army. After bingo she went back to Julie's house in Luton as she was going to catch the 21.30 train back to Harlington. As fate would have it, she needed to use the toilet and back then the nearest toilet was in Park Square. As she came out she bumped into granddad, they got talking and he asked her if he could walk her home, she said 'I live in Harlington, but you can walk me to the train station' which he did. Things must have been going well because that evening she asked him to join her at the Sainsburys dance on the 3rd Feb. The rest as they say is history! They married on the 9th July 1966 in the Methodist chapel, their friend Stella played the organ at the service, after the knot was tied they popped into the Fox pub on Darley Hall, Breechwood Green where they were given a cheque and a bottle of champagne by the air crew from Luton airport. They went on honeymoon in the September to Caister on Sea with Grandad's Mum and Dad!

Their first home should have been in Lilley Bottom but 10 days before they were married this was broken into. They were then given a cottage at Diamond End where they stayed for a short while before being offered a house at 14 Robinson

Crescent Harlington in June 1967 and Mum (Annie) was born in August 1967. Uncle Stephen then came along in 1969 and their family was complete in 1971 when Uncle Robert was born. Nanny went to work at Orchard House as cleaner when Uncle Robert went to Lady Zia Warner School as she needed to be home when the taxi used to drop him off home.

Nanny, Grandad and Uncle Robert left Harlington in 1987 and moved back to Scotland and Grandad started work at Erskine Tractors. After 13 months Nanny wanted to move back to England (probably due to the weather) and Grandad applied for a job with Collins Brothers in Great Gransden, which he got, and they moved soon after. Nanny started working at Potton Timber as a cleaner and she was then employed in the canteen. She loved that job and the people she worked with and used to speak about them all the time.

Janice and Dave were neighbours of Nanny and Grandads and mum took Janice under her wing and used to call her her other daughter. They then left Gransden 1999 when Grandad was 60 and they came back to none other than Harlington, No. 2 Robinson Crescent in fact, where she had a job cleaning at the Upper School. She used to say that she was the "best Scrubber but she had no red hat!"

She joined the WI in 1999 and was also a part of Bright Hour where she would make teas for everyone. She was asked to be a pastoral visitor and loved going to see everyone including the 'older' people.

She and Grandad Celebrated their 50th Wedding Anniversary in the Village Hall in Harlington in 2016.

As she got older herself she felt she had to slow down a little but still loved a good party. She loved her garden and really enjoyed the simple things in life. Nanny was very much looking forward to my wedding in July this year, she used to always ask, when are you going to get married, you are getting married, what's taking you so long? She became slower with her dementia and just before Christmas 2023 she was admitted to hospital.

The Church was very important to her, she loved her friends and adored her family especially her two grandsons and she would do anything for anyone, someone who you could really depend on. Many of you will have your own personal stories and memories of our nanny if you feel happy to share them please do, if not remember the good times that you have shared and smile, she would have wanted that.

Christine Ward, a wife, mum, Nan and a good friend to so many who will be missed by all those whose lives she has touched.



Crafternoon Tea plus Wellbeing Walks

Crafternoon Tea meets fortnightly on Monday afternoons, between 2 and 4 pm, at the Methodist Church on Sundon Road. There are likely to be all sorts of crafts on the go, and we are happy to share what skills we have with others. We have materials, tools and magazines available, some always on the premises, and some which can be brought in if required, so let me know if there is something you are likely to want.

Our April meetings will be 8^{th} , and 22^{nd} on Zoom as well as in person, and refreshments are served at each meeting.



This is a combination of two skills – quilting (on a very small scale) and Sashiko, which is a Japanese embroidery technique. The products shown here are coasters. A top layer, of sashiko embroidery on plain fabric, quilted with a very thin layer of wadding, and a patterned lower layer, and edged with yet a third fabric, which, in these instances, are also patterned. The whole thing is approximately 5 inches

square. The Sashiko templates are about $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches square, and come in several designs that I have seen – they belong to a member of the other craft group I belong to. I can think of other ways in which the embroidery might be used, and may look into acquiring some templates for myself – or for the use of the group. Have you tried something new recently?



Quidditch




Nazareth, and the wedding at Cana.
