Letter from Rev. Claudia Lupi, Methodist Minister

Dear friends of Harlington,

I would like to make a biblical reference while also considering addressing also to an atheist or God-seeking public.

This month Christian communities celebrate Pentecost. This is a festival celebrated 49 days after Easter, to remember the descent of the Holy Spirit on the Apostles. This event crowns the Easter period and celebrates the birth of the Church. According to believers, the Holy Spirit created diversity and unity together and one cannot be sought without the other. I'm in accordance with the bible; the Holy Spirit, on the day of Pentecost, descended on each one and then put everyone in communication. This means that everyone has been given a gift that must be valued.

Non-believers can grasp this event or story in a symbolic and constructive way: the birth and shaping of "a new, diverse and united people". This calls believers and non-believers to unity in difference, without falling into the temptation of seeking only diversity or becoming rigid in exclusionary positions, when one closes oneself in one's own particularisms or beliefs, judging others in the inability to listen and perhaps considering themselves the best or the ones who are always right. In the religious field they are the so-called "guardians of the truth".

At the same time we must not seek unity without diversity by conforming to others and forgetting our identity by homogenising ourselves to others. May this 'Pentecost' event, celebrated in Christian communities, remember and stimulate everyone to welcome and love without discriminating against races, cultures, religions, sexual orientations, genders, different from us. May our village always be the mirror of this openness and welcome, always kind and ready to have a new heart open to others.

Pentecost is an English (from the Greek) name for the Jewish festival of Shavuot. It occurs 50 days (hence pente) from the first day of Passover (inclusive counting). Shavuot means week and it is also known in English as the Feast of Weeks (seven weeks or a week of weeks after Passover). Shavuot was a festival celebrating the wheat harvest. On this festival day, the Disciples received the Holy Spirit, and the name Pentecost has been appropriated by the Christian church. Anglicans and Methodists tended in the past to use the term Whitsun, although this has increasingly gone out of fashion since 1972 when the Bank Holiday was moved from Whit Monday to the last Monday in May. Particularly in the North of England you will still see Whit processions, but the evangelical Whit Monday meetings changed date.

Mrs Audrey Gammon

Audrey was born in July 1933 to parents Jock and May and was the middle girl of three. As their father was a professional footballer, the family moved to live in the area of whichever team he was playing for – so Barbara was born in London, Audrey in Walsall and Josie in Kent. When Audrey was six the Second World War commenced, her father joined the British Army and her mother, together with her very good friend Mollie, lived in the family flat in Neasden as they worked together as part of the war effort. For a short period of time towards the end of the war they were evacuated to their paternal grandparents in Dundee. But Audrey's final years of schooling were back in Willesden, north London. When she left at the age of fifteen, her Headmaster wrote this glowing report:

"Audrey is intelligent, industrious and of considerably more than average ability. In addition she is unusually conscientious and thorough, has a pleasing manner, a happy disposition and she takes pains with all she does. She is completely honest, reliable and trustworthy, popular with teachers and fellow pupils alike and as a prefect she has carried out responsible duties in a highly satisfactory manner".

A perceptive report showing early personality traits which were to remain with Audrey throughout her life. When she left school she commenced her working life as a PA with Ascot Water Heating, and it was here that she met the young man she would go on to marry. His name was Patrick Gammon – known to everyone as Pat – and there was an instant attraction between them. They started going out together and married on 12th September 1959 at Neasden Methodist Church. They honeymooned in Jersey and made their first home in Wembley.

Two years later Audrey and Pat moved to what is still the family home in Harlington. It was a new-build house, they even watched it being built! Right up until she was eight months pregnant, Audrey continued to travel to London by train. With the birth of Paul and Claire, the family was complete and Audrey became a very loving mother, kind, loving and always there for them, her children say they had an idyllic childhood. Audrey became very involved in community groups including litter picking, collecting newspaper for recycling, babysitting and she often attended Parish Council meetings.

When they were younger her children remember some great holidays, often in Devon and also the Isle of Man, where Pat indulged his love of TT Racing. Audrey wasn't left out; she rode pillion in her early days and went on to take a great interest in the sport herself. Later on they holidayed further afield, visiting places such as Bruges, Amsterdam, Venice, Yugoslavia and Spain. She and Pat had shared an interest in the Second World War visiting places such as Arnhem. Something they didn't share was a love of dancing – but before marriage Audrey

had been very keen and a most accomplished dancer.

In 1973 Audrey took a job at Greenfield Primary School where she worked as a secretary for ten years. She then had a complete career change, because her last job saw her working for Marks & Spencer in Luton in their food department where she remained until she retired in 1998. She was a valued employee, and wherever she worked, she not only made many friends, she kept them as well.

Audrey was close to her sisters, and the bond between them grew even stronger when Barbara and her family moved to Sundon Park. Although Audrey had been heartbroken when Josie went to live in Australia for a time, she was all the more delighted when Josie finally settled in a house just across the road.

Pat died nearly nineteen years ago and, understandably, his death left Audrey in pieces, they'd been together for over 50 years and were true partners, they'd been a good team and she missed him dreadfully. She described him simply as "one in a million". However, she was a strong lady and she coped – she continued to live in the family home where her garden gave her a great deal of comfort. Whenever she was stressed or there were problems, she'd be straight out into the garden. She particularly enjoyed working in the front garden where she'd catch up with friends and find out what was going on in the village. It's no exaggeration to say that it was her love of her garden, plus the home that she'd shared with the family, that kept her in the village. She also had many other interests: the theatre in London and Milton Keynes, ballet, antique auctions, the Heritage Trust, the National Trust.

Life was progressing well – despite the fact that fourteen years ago Audrey had been diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. She was one of the small percentage of people to be successfully operated on but it took her the best part of a year to make a full recovery. Consequently, when she was diagnosed with serious lung problems last October, she declined treatment - not wanting to go through any further medical procedures. She was cared for at home and died peacefully, at home, and she is now reunited with Pat.

It's been said that she was "born in the wrong era" because she was quite traditional, very dignified and you never heard her grumble, complain or use offensive language. But, more importantly, it's also been said that she was the most amazing, unselfish and strong woman who chose the perfect father for Paul and Claire and the most wonderful husband for herself. She was a major part of family life; a supportive and devoted wife, a loving sister and mother, a caring aunt and a loyal friend, and although she will be very much missed, she leaves some wonderful memories which will live on.

Edna Holton 1928 – 2024

Edna Holton lived in Harlington for about 32 years, and has recently passed away aged 96. Although she lived in Barton Road for many years, she had more recently moved to a care home in Hastings to be nearer her family.

Edna was born in east London in 1928 and went to school in Edgware, then on to technical college. She was very competent at shorthand, and good at maths and book keeping. Her father passed away when she was just 16, but her mum lived to the ripe old age of 102. She had one younger sister, Audrey.

With her first husband Dennis, Edna ran a cafe for a while in London, during which time she had two sons, Simon and Chris. When her marriage broke down, Edna worked for Lucas Services in Borehamwood from 1964-1976, working her way up from the position of clerk to be the secretary to the service director. She then worked for Giltspur Engineering Design as the Director's personal assistant. During this time she met her second husband John at an Over-50s Club. They courted for 5 years and were then married at Ampthill registry office in May 1988. Their reception was held at The Jolly Coopers pub in Flitton, and they would return to the pub every year for their anniversary, and have their photo taken in the pub garden.

John and Edna loved to travel, enjoying their many holidays together, and they loved to dance. John was also a keen photographer and kept neat albums with all their holiday snaps. Using his experience as an amateur photographer, he judged the Photography classes at the village Flower Show for many years. Edna was a lady who took pride in her appearance and was always immaculately dressed. It's hard to believe that this same lady was also an accomplished badminton player.

When John died in 2018, Edna found it harder to cope on her own and was quite 'lost' without him. She then appreciated visits from friends, and started going to church events and Ladies Bright Hour. Sadly, dementia gradually took away her memory and ability to cope at home, even with carers calling in to help with personal care and neighbours checking that she had eaten etc. Her favourite food though was chocolate, and she looked forward to daily visits from one kind neighbour in particular – he usually came with a small chocolate bar!

Many of us had got to know her so much better before she left the village, and were sorry to see her leave Harlington.

The information about her life is taken from the tribute given by her son Chris at her funeral, with some additional information.



Harlington Community Speedwatch & HLS Fair

Launched by Bedfordshire Police back in 2009 as part of their community watch schemes including streetwatch, dogwatch & horse watch.

Speedwatch was designed to equip volunteers to help highlight & monitor speed concerns in their local area.

It was not designed to be an enforcement scheme, but an educational one aimed at raising awareness of speed restrictions and encouraging drivers to reduce their speed to the legal limits in areas where speeding has been identified as a concern.

Normally they only allow groups to monitor four different roads. In Harlington were allowed to monitor five: Sundon Road, Westoning Road, Goswell End Road, Barton Road and Toddington Road. All exact monitoring locations have been risk assessed by Beds police for basic health and safety reasons and location criteria, such as not being too close to any junctions, on a bend and having a hardstanding surface.

Since Harlington speedwatch restarted in February 2023 it has completed 74 sessions around the village averaging 74 hours totalled by its volunteers, has checked 12290 vehicles and has registered 260 vehicles speeding, their details get sent to Beds police who take further action.



<u>New Priest-in-Charge</u>: we are getting closer to the licensing service for our new Priest-in-Charge, Father Mark, on June 5th. Attendance at this service is by invitation only but there will be a further service of welcome at Westoning Church at 10am on June 9th, giving everyone a chance to meet him.

<u>Churchyard:</u> Various wild flowers are starting to appear as the weather warms up a bit. We're waiting to see if the bee orchids put in an appearance again which would be a real treat. Take a walk through and see what you can spot. By the way, what do unionized bees want?......More honey and shorter working flowers of course!

Recycling collection: a reminder that we collect empty biscuit wrappers (sweet and savoury), plastic cake wrappers and crisp packets. Eg Packets for digestives, Cheddars, Ryvita, mini rolls, crumpets, Kit Kat and Twix or shop own brand. You can leave them in the marked black bin inside the side church gate opposite the vicarage. These are then sent to Terracycle to be recycled. We do not take cardboard which can go in your normal household bin, and neither can we take any other plastic packaging eg for fruit and veg, tea bags, pet food sachets, washing powder. We also no longer collect chocolate wrappers.
