I have had several people tell me how pleased they have been with their tomatoes; how sweet and juicy they are even if they have taken their time coming and ripening. I was thrilled to see in the RHS magazine that I had grown some of their recommended varieties so those of you who bought my beefsteak Costoluto Fiorentino, Shirley



or Sungold you were in with the in-crowd! I have just made my second batch of tomato soup but it is so delicious I keep eating it and I am supposed to be freezing and saving it, I have eaten lots of salads (salad leaves, tomatoes, cucumber, beetroot), all grown from my garden or allotment often eaten within 20 minutes of picking. My reward for watering is to munch on some freshly picked raspberries or strawberries, what a privilege and reward for my labours. I bet there are a lot of you reading this that would agree and have your own stories and memories.

Anyway, on with our fundraising. Over £1950 has been raised from the front of my house on plants and garden sundries this year. 
