Dear friends of Harlington,

What's new at SMC and the Harlington Surgery?

If you are a new mum, the surgery will contact you with an appointment for your baby's first vaccination at 8 weeks. Thereafter you will need to book your baby's immunisations at 12 and 16 weeks.

Do you have medication you're not using?

Please be advised that you can return any unused medication to the Harlington dispensary, or to any pharmacy, so they can destroy it in a safe manner.

A Year in the Life

January, so the song goes, brings the snow; makes your feet and fingers glow. Those of sufficient age may know the rest of the song as it runs through the weather for a year.

Having a little space this month I thought I would review a year.

The year starts with New Years Day, of course, and a traditional New Year's Day Walk, led by Toddington Rambling Club. We are still in the Christmas season, which continues till Candlemas, although most consider it finishes with 12th Night, when superstition requires decorations to come down.

February brings Valentine's Day, not celebrated that much in the village, although there is usually a Disco for the children. Depending on the date of Easter, we have Shrove Tuesday, celebrated by Pancakes, with Pancake Parlour at the Methodist Church, in aid of our charity for the year.

March (or April if it's late) brings Easter. Palm Sunday brings a donkey to St. Mary's, then the Churches join together to walk round the village on Good Friday, and in recent years have performed dramatized and costumed versions of the Easter story, before gathering in St. Mary's for Hot Cross Buns, which now appear in the shops all year round and with their origin forgotten.

April comes with the occasional April Fool, and with St. George's Day, another event not much celebrated here.

May starts with May Day, again not celebrated. I do remember when there was Maypole dancing at the Lower School.

June heralds the start of Summer. Harlington in Bloom has it's Summer planting.

July, at the end of the school year, brings the Lower School Summer Fair, which is now one of the few Outdoor fun days remaining. Anyone want to restart the Village Carnival?

August features the Village Show, with produce, craft and cooking; with enough categories that most people could enter one.

September is a restart month, when things that were dormant in the school holidays start up again.

October is when the churches celebrate harvest, although harvesting is done in July and August for the most part, depending on the weather and crop. It finishes with the Halloween Fayre, and that imported custom of Trick or Treat. At least in the village there is a convention; if there is a pumpkin outside it's OK to call.

November has the Remembrance Sunday gathering at the War Memorial, when
