Christmas letter from St. Mary's Church

For most people December means Christmas and Christmas means shopping for gifts or food preparation. It is a very busy time of year, and a time when it is easy to lose sight of what is at the heart of Christmas. One way of helping us do this is through the Christmas carols we hear throughout December.

Sometimes, however, we might not be sure whether what we are hearing is actually quite accurate. A short chapter in the light-hearted book 'Christmas: tradition, truth and total baubles' points out, tongue-in-cheek, that the words of one of the top three most popular carols, are not strictly meteorologically accurate.

In the bleak midwinter, frosty wind made moan, Earth stood hard as iron, water like a stone; Snow had fallen, snow on snow, snow on snow, In the bleak midwinter, long ago.

In actual fact, the likelihood was that it was not quite that cold. Nick Page, the author of the book comments: "if the shepherds were in the fields, then the frosty wind was not making any moaning, the earth was considerably less hard than iron, and the water was like ... well ... water." However, he concedes that, had the poem started "in the slightly chilly late autumn ..." it would not quite have the same effect, or be quite so memorable. He is right there!

This beautiful, profound poem by Christina Rosetti, which has two wonderful musical settings, one by Holst and one by Darke, concludes with words that challenge us directly:

What can I give Him, poor as I am? If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb; If I were a Wise Man, I would do my part; Yet what I can I give Him: give my heart.

However busy you are this December, do make time to come and hear and sing carols that retell the Christmas story, that tell of the best Christmas gift of all.

The village carol service with the Salvation Army is on Wednesday 18th December at 6.30 pm at the Lincoln Way shops. Brain Tumour Research



A Glimmer of Hope!



My daughter Emma just happened to tune in

to PM on 29th October and 25 minutes into the programme her ears pricked up as she heard some familiar names; Dr Paul Mulholland, the man responsible for Pete's chemotherapy treatment, and who has devised an experimental therapy on patients who are suffering a Glioblastoma (GBM) Brain Tumour. It has been used on 1 person so far, a man in Luton, Paul, and his tumour has halved in size. The procedure is basically a device under his scalp into which a radio active drug is fed directly into the tumour.

GMB is a terminal illness from diagnosis; it affects people of all ages, 3000 die each year and there is only an average survival of 9 months. Treatments are aggressive and involves surgery, chemotherapy for 6 weeks and radiotherapy, their survival at this point would be 5/6 months. When patients join this trial they will already have undergone this first course of treatment and when the tumour recurs they can be invited to enter the trial. Paul, from Luton, entered the trial 3 months after radiotherapy. Neurosurgeon, Miss Sethi at Queens Square carried out the operation where she removed a small amount of tumour and inserted a tube into the remaining tumour then sealed it up inside. Olaperib is a drug used generally for ovarian cancer and for this study it has been modified so it can be made into a solution and injected into the tumour and also modified to hold a tiny bit of radioactivity. This drug goes into the tumour and delivers the radioactivity just to the tumour cell. Paul Mulholland explained that the drug is not usually radioactive and doesn't get to the brain as a tablet, making this quite remarkable.

This is in the early stages as a trial but the 2nd person will have had their second treatment on the 30/10. The 3rd patient will have their operation and tube fitted soon and the 4th patient will join the trial in January. There will be 14 altogether initially and then expand to do combination treatment so target treatment into the tumour and then a treatment that goes around the body like immunotherapy. Paul Mulholland invited the pharmaceutical industry to contact the team with their immunotherapy drugs to partner with them to deliver the rest of this study.

So you can imagine my joy and optimism for our fundraising and I hope that those of you have supported any of my fundraising events will also share this joy and optimism. Yes it is early days, yes it is only one person but there is some progress. I emailed Paul Mulholland to thank him and wish him "every success in the development of this treatment and look forward to following its progress and extended life chances for those living with a brain tumour" and he replied

"Thank you for your message and words of encouragement. We will keep fighting to find better treatments for this terrible disease'

So we march on!!

What a busy October and more good news to deliver: Plant sales at my house have now reached £2080.29, I am thrilled thank you all so much.

Also do you recall Saturday 19th October? What an awful start to the day. I had a river running down my drive and it was my garage sale, but you turned out and supported, even sat in my gazebo to have a cup of coffee/tea and piece of cake and you raised £449.56 on the day. I received £155 in donations after that, thank you for your generosity and I have sold other items since so the total is now in excess of £600. Thank you all for supporting and donating. Thank you also to Liz and Jacqui for serving refreshments and providing yummy cakes and to Sylvia and Debbie for your delicious cakes. To Judy and Rita thank you for your jams and preserves. Finally thank you to Gill and Bob and their neighbour's son who saved the day on the Sunday as the gazebo was about to take off whilst I was out, thank you for your help rescuing and helping to take down the gazebo, where would I be without you all!!

Fundraising does not stop. I hope to report on the tea coffee event on the 23rd November in the next Contact. I will be at the centre MK on the 18th November selling merchandise and with a collecting tin. Please look out for me and come and say hello. I am selling Christmas cards at my church, Holy Family, at all masses on the weekend 16/17th November and at St John's Sundon on the 1st December. I will be outside Tesco on 16th December collecting for the Rotary Club who will donate to BTR for our support and anything and anywhere else I get the chance to spread the news and raise funds for research. I haven't organised a Christmas post delivery in Harlington this year as there was so little interest but if you need help please get in touch.

Harlington Neighbourhood Help (HNH) started in May 2000 as a pioneer group for Bedfordshire with initial funding of £200 and 80 volunteers.

We have again completed over 400 'jobs' this year in the village

Transport requests are for anyone who has difficulty using local public transport, but tend to come from our older residents. DBS checked **volunteer drivers** drive people to and wait during the appointment, and are reimbursed at the rate of 45p per mile. We always need more drivers. Most local journeys are currently completely free thanks to donations.



Wednesday Coffee Mornings and Games



Location and opening times

The Flitwick Community Fridge is located at the Food Hub next to The Rufus Centre on Steppingley Road. Ample free parking is available for visitors. The fridge is typically open Monday to Friday from 09:30-11:30 and 14:30-17:30, as well as Saturdays from 09:30-13:30, subject to stock availability.

You can select up to 3kg of food per household using a basket. Someone from the team will weigh the food and complete an anonymous form (only asking for a postcode) to allow them to track the needs and preferences of service users.

Additionally, special openings on Friday evenings (9.15pm to 9.45pm) and Sunday afternoons (4.40pm to 5pm) allow for the distribution of surplus food collected from local supermarkets that has to be used on the same day. At these times you can take up to five items on a first-come, first-served basis and will be asked to take a ticket when you arrive, which will secure your place in the queue.

Food donations

Most food in the fridge is generously donated by local businesses, including Tesco Flitwick (daily), Aldi Flitwick (weekdays), Waitrose Ampthill (Friday) and Co-op Flitwick (Monday and Wednesday) and they welcome donations including surplus produce from gardens and allotments but do have strict rules to follow.

Hedgehogs

Hello - First I'd like to say a massive THANK YOU to everyone who has supported the Hogspital over the last year. Whether with newspapers, donations of

money or things from the Amazon wishlist, it's all deeply appreciated & I couldn't do it without you. A massive THANK YOU must also go to Gwen Gray who gave the Hogspital £100 from her garage sale, and the Village Show committee who also gave £100 for the Hogspital. I feel very humbled & extremely blessed. Your donations have enabled the purchase of a Brinsea TLC portable incubator, it can run from a 12v supply in a car & has been invaluable for collecting abandoned babies.

To date (Nov 7th) the Hogspital has had 183 hogs through its doors this year, from tiny abandoned hoglets weighing 6grams to heavily pregnant sows who then produced 5 beautiful babies in the safety of a garden run. Injuries



have ranged from traffic accidents resulting in broken legs & head injuries, strimmer damage, dog attacks & sadly hogs used as footballs. Hedgehogs have come in from as close as 2 or 3 doors away to St Albans, Hatfield, Milton Keynes & the far side of Bedford. I've been privileged to deliver talks to Brownies, Beavers, the WI, schools & other community groups.

It is hard emotionally, when dealing with some of the brutal injuries inflicted by humans, and I've spent far too many evenings with a pair of pointy tweezers picking maggots from strimmer wounds, but it's all worth it when a hedgehog that came in as a 70 gram baby covered in ticks & flystrike is returned to its finder for release as a healthy 800g adult.

So once again - THANK YOU.
