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A letter from St. Mary's Church

January brings the snow Makes your feet and fingers glow February's ice and sleet Freeze the toes right off your feet

This musical concise summary of the weather comes from my late father-inlaw's favourite comic duo, Flanders and Swann. Their song never ceased to amuse audiences who could identify with the British preoccupation with the weather and the constant moaning about how awful it is. Added to that, the nights seem long and drawn out, and when daytime seems like night because it is so damp and dreary, our spirits tend to drop. Yet, as any scientist will tell you, cold is how the weather is meant to be in winter, and its coldness is important to maintain a healthy ecological balance. Long dark nights come with the season, but on a clear, crisp, cloudless night offer the opportunity to see the stars more clearly, or even occasionally meteor showers or perhaps the stunning Northern Lights. Then there are the wonderful very early spring flowers, most especially snowdrops, peeping through the soil and hinting at the pleasures to come of the later spring flowers. Plus, the good news that every single February day brings 2 or 3 minutes more daylight.

For some churches February is particularly significant. The season of Epiphany, which follows straight after Christmas and focuses on the signs that Jesus was truly the saviour of the world, ends with a celebration of light at Candlemas on the first Sunday of February. The baby Jesus is recognised by the devout Simeon and Anna when he comes to be presented in the Temple as 'a light to lighten the Gentiles', but Simeon also recognises that Jesus can only save the world through suffering. So then our attention finally moves away from the celebration of Christmas towards preparations for Easter, which formally begin with the season of Lent that starts this year in March.

In the meantime, let's use this month as an opportunity to reflect on ways in which we can shine a light in other people's lives. Let's celebrate the light, the light that even shines in the dark night sky. Or as the poet Gerard Manley Hopkins would say:

The world is charged with the grandeur of God It will flame out, like shining from shook foil.



Harlington Neighbourhood Help (HNH) started in May 2000 as a pioneer group for Bedfordshire with initial funding of £200 and 80 volunteers.

We currently have 23 volunteers, most who are drivers, but we also have nondrivers as we help with forms, prescription collections, shopping etc.

We have again completed over 400 'jobs' this year in the village

Transport requests are for anyone who has difficulty using local public transport, but tend to come from our older residents. DBS checked **volunteer drivers** drive people to and wait during the appointment, and are reimbursed at the rate of 45p per mile. We always need more drivers. Most local journeys are currently completely free thanks to donations.

Our committee has 7 members including a Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, and Minutes Secretary. All are volunteers and are elected at the AGM each year.

I hope you had a wonderful start to the New Year. As we step into 2025, we are excited to share some important updates in the way we manage patient appointments at the surgery. By now, you should have received a text message or a letter explaining


that SMC will be moving to a new system called **Patient Triage**.

As you may have noticed, the healthcare landscape is changing rapidly, and so are the needs of our patients. With increasing demands on GP services, we want to ensure that every patient receives timely and appropriate care.

Patient Triage is a system where every patient request is assessed by a healthcare professional before an appointment is made. Whether you contact us online, by phone, or in person, your concerns will be reviewed to determine the best course of action. This ensures you receive the right care at the right time.

How Does it work?

You submit your request online by going to the SMC website located at **sundonmedicalcentre.nhs.uk**, then select either the **New Request** or the **Appointments** tab. (See the arrowed tabs below).

Select the questionnaire that relates to your concern. Provide details about your symptoms, concerns or requests. It is important you provide as much information as possible. Rest assured that all information is treated with the utmost confidentiality.

A clinician and GP assistant will review your request and determine the next steps. Depending on your needs, you might be offered a same-day appointment, a routine appointment, a phone consultation or advice on self-care or pharmacy services.

If your situation is deemed to be urgent, we will ensure you are seen promptly.

What if I can't use the internet?

If you don't have internet access, you can phone the surgery between 8:00 am and 6:00 pm Monday to Friday. A receptionist will then go through everything with you.



Crafternoon Tea plus Harlington Surgery and SMC

When I was a Brownie, 60 plus years ago, those of us who couldn't already knit were taught, by knitting a dishcloth – remember them? Even those of us who could knit were expected to produce the dishcloth, in order to qualify for the



knitting badge. And even now, sometimes it can be scary to look at a pattern for something large, and many people like to start a new skill with something small – and then they don't know where to find a "small" something that is interesting, or useful, dishcloths no longer being a thing. If you are in that position, there are a number of "small" things we have patterns for. "Bonding squares" are used in hospitals for mothers and babies who cannot spend all their time together, perhaps because the baby is in an incu-

bator, or the mother is seriously ill. They each wear a square of identical pattern and colour (so they are made in pairs), and these are swapped regularly – giving the baby the scent of the mother, and helping child to bond to mother.

When my mother and I first learned to crochet, we started with patterns that were made in squares and then sewn together – she made me a pram blanket, and I made my best friend a pram blanket – same book of basic patterns, but different patterns.

So if you want to start small with a new skill, this is one idea.

Crafternoon Tea meets on alternate Mondays, at Harlington Methodist Church. There are likely to be all sorts of different crafts on the go, and we are happy to share what skills we have with others. We have materials, tools and magazines available, some always on the premises, and some which can be brought in if required, so let me know if there is something you are likely to want.

Our February meetings will be on 10th and 24th. Both meetings will be on Zoom as well as in person, and refreshments will be served at each meeting.

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Messy Church News



Unfortunately Tina was not well and we had to cancel the December Messy church. However this is just the one cancellation, and Messy Church will be continuing in the future, we hope without any further interruptions.

Our next Messy Church will be held on 15th February at 4 pm in the Methodist Church and Halls. When we looked over the things we have covered in the past, we realised that we have not looked at Joseph, that is the first Biblical Joseph of Technicolour Dreamcoat fame. We covered the first part of his life in January, so in February we will be looking at what happened after Pharoah had worrying dreams.

You may wonder why we always say that Messy Church is in the Methodist Church and Halls. That is because we do different activities in different places. We start the activities at 4 pm. The downstairs hall is next to the kitchen, so while one team of helpers is getting food ready for tea, others are working with the children and adults on any food-based activities. These have ranged from cooking cakes, biscuits, meringues or bread, or making Angel Delights, stables from wafers, fruit salad or any of a number of other things that can be eaten. Meanwhile, the upstairs hall has a washable floor, so if paint gets splashed it is easily cleaned. This makes it ideal for activities involving paint or glue or anything else that might make a mess. This is where we make models, paint pictures, glue collages, work with Playdough, sand, stone, cloth, wool, string, paper or cardboard. All sorts of things have emerged from this area, from hopping frogs to golden cities. However, we only have 45 minutes for these, then we all get together in the church for the celebration, where we hear the story, sing, do some more, less messy, activities and pray. The aim is to finish this part by 5.30 pm, because the tea team will have set out the food, and the tables and chairs, for tea in the lower hall by then.

Of course we don't do everything every session. We always aim to have at least one food activity and six or seven others to give plenty of choice in the first session, apart from the two or three we do in the celebration. We can also see those who couldn't get to the church and have joined us on Zoom, look at what they have done and show them what we did. The celebration is also streamed on YouTube, which provides a recording.

Don't forget, while children need an adult, Messy Church is not just for children. If you find that making things helps with the Bible stories, Messy Church may be for you. Clive
