A letter from the Methodist Church

Hi all,

Easter is very late this year, and so all those dates that are fixed to Easter are also late, starting with Shrove Tuesday (4th March), better known these days as Pancake Day—we hope to run Pancake Parlour again this year so watch out for adverts. Pancakes were eaten to use up milk and eggs, as the day after Shrove Tuesday is Ash Wednesday, which is the first day of Lent. From an early time in the Christian church Lent was a time of fasting, and for hundreds of years Christians didn't eat meat or other things from animals during this time.

No one is sure where this custom started. Lent is fascinating in that, at the start of it we're thinking about the start of Jesus' ministry and by the end we're thinking of the end of it three years later.

While we have the stories about Jesus' birth, apart from the one story of him getting lost at the Temple we have nothing else about his life until, at the age of thirty, he arrives at the River Jordan where his cousin John is having a rant about peoples' sinfulness and urging them to be baptised to show their repentance. He recognises Jesus as Messiah, and is surprised that Jesus wants to be baptised. He is persuaded by Jesus to conduct the baptism. Jesus then goes into the desert and fasts for forty days, which is where the length of Lent comes in. By around 300 AD Lent has been attached to Easter as a time of preparation. This may be because a lot of new Christians were baptised at Easter.

While Jesus is fasting, the Bible says he is tempted by the devil. His rejection of these temptations forms a sort of negative manifesto; it says what Jesus will not do to further his work. Turning stones into bread, the first temptation, represents bribery, jumping of the top of the Temple is miracle showmanship and bowing to Satan is compulsion, saying the ends justify the means.

Jesus' positive manifesto comes in the Sermon on the Mount and his other teaching about loving God and neighbours, where the term 'neighbour', as shown in the story of the Good Samaritan, is very widely drawn.

But to go back to the temptations, how often, when you look around the world, do you see leaders using one or more of those methods? (Historically the Christian church has been far from immune from this as well.) Vote for me and I'll give you benefits/cut your taxes. Do as I say or you will be killed or imprisoned. See what a wonderful person I am.

Have pancakes and enjoy Shrove Tuesday, but perhaps in Lent we could think about who we let lead us and why. Maybe this could affect our decisions in future?


Harlington Lower School plus Wednesday Coffee



Mrs Joan Blunt



My Nan, Joan Blunt, was born in Sharpenhoe on 8th January 1938, the eldest child of Violet and Alfred. Three and a half years later, she was joined by her sister Margaret.

Her early life was spent at the family's pub in Sharpenhoe and attending Barton Primary School. Her parents owned the local pub, and on weekends, the family would visit her grandparents and aunt, who owned The Bull pub in Barton. Later, her parents moved the family to Luton briefly, where they ran a shop on Beechwood Road, before returning to

Harlington.

Nanny trained as a shorthand typist and worked as a receptionist at an accountancy firm in Luton—though this was only until she married Grandad. He was the love of her life. While her family was cautious at first, Grandad was a few years older, and Nan only had eyes for him, and Grandad adored her.

They married on the 4th June 1959 at Luton Registry Office when Nanny was 21 years old. True to their nature, they avoided a big fuss and had a quiet wedding before beginning their married life together.

Initially, they lived in Barton and enjoyed travelling around Europe, making wonderful memories and cherishing their time together.

From a young age, Nanny was passionate about animals, particularly dogs, which became a significant part of her adult life.

In 1963, they moved back to Harlington, settling on Church Road, where they built up their landscaping business. This eventually led to the creation of Bridgeside Nurseries, which Grandad built in 1980. Many in the community will remember them from there—it was a hub of activity, even serving as the starting point for local carnival floats.

In 1971, they had my dad, Garry. He completed their family, and instead of jetting off across Europe, they began exploring the UK together. Dad remembers Nanny as always being supportive and caring—even going so far as to write a multitude of letters to excuse him from PE during his school years!

One of my Nan's greatest passions, apart from her family, was breeding and showing dogs, particularly German Shepherds. Through this, she met her lifelong friend Jen. Together, they shared a love of dog shows, collecting rosettes... and enjoying the occasional glass of wine!

Nanny and Grandad loved the outdoors. They enjoyed walking their dogs up the

Clappers and were known for their love of gardening and plants. For them, gardening wasn't just work—it was woven into their lives, even in retirement, when Nan would help out with volunteering for Harlington in Bloom.

When Dad met my mum, Heather, in 1997, Nan supported them in setting up their first home, just in time for my arrival. I have memories of Nanny and Grandad taking me to see tractors (one of my first loves) and having dinner with them every Saturday when Mum was at work. A few years later, my brother Fred was born, and the Saturday lunches continued. We'd often visit garden centres and pick flowers and carrots we'd grown from their garden.

Nan and Grandad were keen to get us involved in gardening. I was taught how to lay a patio at the age of five, while Fred learnt about planting. While they may have used us as labour, we were well rewarded with Nan's home cooking. Her puddings were legendary—her trifle in particular! We have been conducting trifle experiments at home sampling different ingredients as unfortunately, she has hidden her secret recipes too well. However, Fred especially loved what he called her "triangles," named after their shape, but for me, it was all about the crumbles.

Nanny and Grandad were inseparable and rarely seen apart. They worked together, lived together, and enjoyed travelling with Grandad's siblings to the coast and attending dog shows with friends. They celebrated 53 years of happy marriage together.

Grandad passed away in August 2012 after a short illness. We were able to care for him at home until the end. His loss was a huge blow to the family, and Nan never stopped grieving for him. However, she was blessed with the support of her friends in the village, who lifted her spirits and helped her navigate life without him.

After which, Nan was joined by her dog, Meg, and later by Oggie, who became her constant companion. In the last year, when she struggled to walk Oggie, her friends stepped in and walked him daily. Nanny—and we as a family—were so grateful for their kindness, which allowed her to keep Oggie.

Nanny was able to remain in their home down Goswell End Road, which she shared with Grandad surrounded by the memories they had created together.

In early December, Nanny became unwell and, after a short illness, passed away just before Christmas with Dad by her side.

Nan, we love you and will miss you deeply, but we are comforted by the thought that you are now reunited with Grandad tending to the garden with some fresh plants and vegetables.






